### **Getting Started**

*Remember!* The earlier you start, the more time you will have to find information to complete your project

### **Making Your Plan**

*Consider:*

- How detailed will your research have to be?
- How long does your paper have to be?
- What subject areas are involved?
- What types of information/resources are needed?
- Where will you find your resources?

*Actions:*

- Get familiar with your campus library
- Talk to Mid-State library staff
- Find out what resources you can get from your library
- Choose a topic and have it approved by your instructor
- Select your information resources

## **Evaluating Your Resources**

- Who is the author? – Check the author's credentials
- What audience was it written for?
- Is the information current and/or biased?
- Is the level of the information appropriate for your project?
- Is there is a list of references and bibliography cited by the author?

## **APA Writing Format:**

**American Psychological Association (APA) style** is a widely-accepted style of documentation for written research reports, academic term papers, theses, dissertations, and for scholarly manuscripts submitted for publication in Psychology, Sociology, Business, Economics, Nursing, Social Work, Criminology and other disciplines of the Social Sciences, and in some fields that cross disciplinary boundaries – such as Communications and Media Studies.

This guide is intended as a quick reference on citing in APA format a reference list for some of the most common types of materials. For in-text citations, consult the *Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association*, which is available for student use at MSTC campus libraries. The call number for this manual is **BF76.7.C66 2005**. Hanging indents – it means the second line is indented – are acceptable, but **check with your instructor to learn more about the citation style required for your course or discipline.**

### ***Book by two authors:***

Draine, C., & Hall, B. (2000). *Culture shock! Indonesia*. Portland.: Graphic Arts Center.

### ***Edited Book:***

Tsim, T. L., & Wong, C. Y. (Eds.) (1991). *The other Hong Kong Reports*. Hong Kong: The Chinese University Press.

### ***Book, no author or editor:***

*The world book* (2006). New York: Crown.

**Multivolume edited work:**

Tse, S. (Ed.) (1989-1995). *Hong Kong taxation: regulations and practice* (Vols. 1-7). Hong Kong: Hong Kong University Press.

**Article or chapter in edited work:**

Munan, H. L. (2001). French culture and society. In G. H. Brame (Ed.), *Living & working in France* (pp. 3-26). New York: McGraw-Hill.

**Chapter in a volume in a series:**

McMillan, E.E., & Jones, C. (1999). Socialization in the context of the family. In P. H. Mussen (Series Ed.) & B. K. Hetherington (Vol. Ed.), *International handbook of child psychology: Vol.3. Socialization, personality, and social development* (3rd ed., pp. 132-168). New York: Wiley.

**Journal article:**

Charter, F. W. (2005). An overview of Japanese ancient art. *Fine Arts*, 18 (2), 78-80.

**Magazine article:**

Plopper, C. B. (2003, April 14). The myth of media violence. *Newsweek*, 262, 33-36.

**Newspaper article:**

Yesterday, today and tomorrow. (2004, July 11). *Kansas City Star*, p. B3.

**Article in a reference book:**
